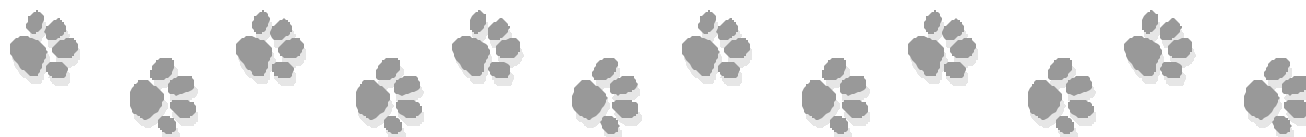

## VICE CHIEF OF ACTIVITIES SAYS "THANK YOU"

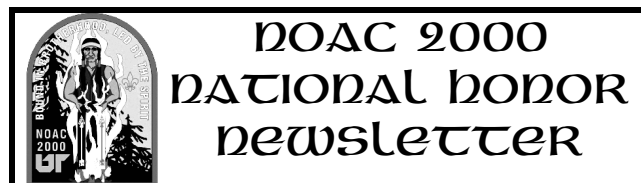
My Brothers,

## TURTLE CLAN UPDATE



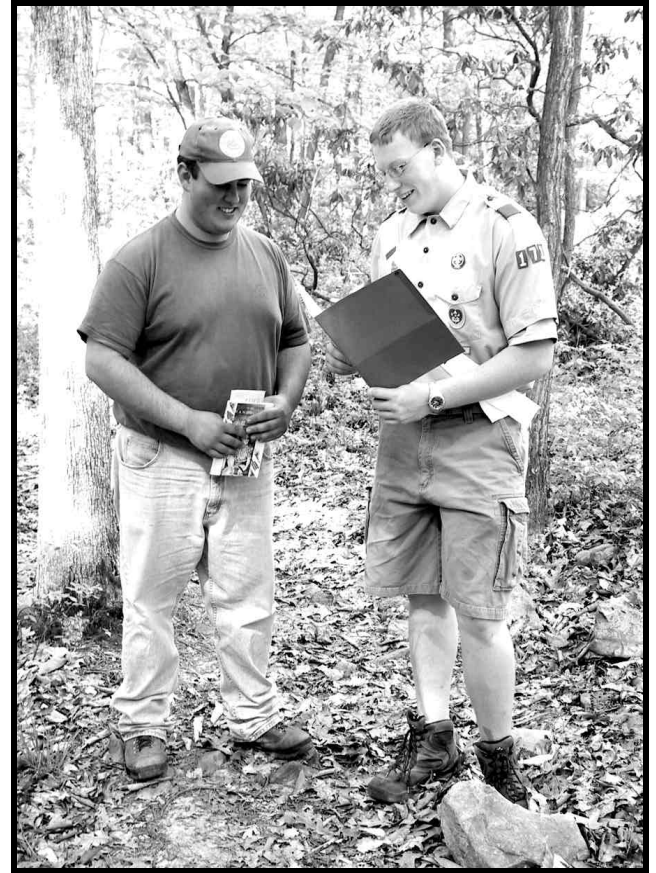

Joe has announced that the next meeting, he will be bringing homemade pudding and pie.

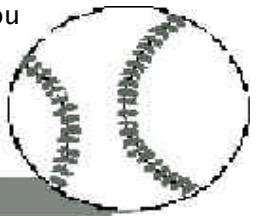

## OA SCUTOPIA SHOW TO BE BIG HIT AT JAMBOREE

If you will be attending the 2001 National Jamboree as a participant this year, you don't want to miss the Scoutopia program area. It is the sequel to the highly acclaimed *Odyssey of the Law* OA production at the 1997 National Boy Scout Jamboree.

Quoting the OA Shows publicity information, "Scoutopia is the merging of the words "scout" and "utopia". Perhaps it can best be explained as a place...a place in a Scout's mind... a place where character lives. In today's digital world kids know that the objective in an action-adventure video game is to advance to the next level. We will define for a Scout that *Scoutopia* is the next level... where a boy becomes a man... where a boy understands the meaning of character, ethics and responsibility taught by the Scout Oath and Law... where he applies those things - that character - to his life each and every day."

The air-conditioned (Yes, an escape from the grueling heat of Fort A.P. Hill in July) building will be fitted with 500+ theatre seats in tiers surrounding a custom stage, full theatrical lighting and sound, large screen video/television, a 12' to 14' turntable, and lots of special effects such as lasers, fog, and pyrotechnics.

Showing 6-8 times per day, *Scoutopia* is a partnership between Boy Scouts of America and the U.S. Marine Corp, two organizations that highly value the twin responsibilities of duty and honor. The Jamboree theme of "Strong Values, Strong Leaders" will come to life in the presentation.

Seating is very limited, but each youth Jamboree participant will receive a ticket for a designated date and time. Adults, staff, and visitors to the Jamboree should plan on waiting in line, as seating for them will be on an as-available basis after youth have been seated for each show.

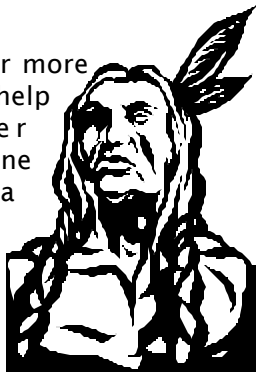
## ORDEAL COMMITTEE

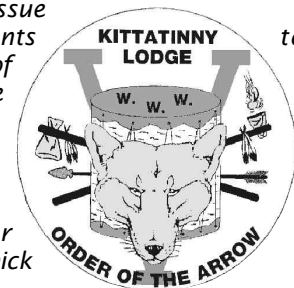

## OA SCOUTREACH MENTORING PROGRAM

The Order of Arrow Scoutreach Mentoring Program is a joint effort of the national Scoutreach Division of the Boy Scouts of America and the Order of the Arrow. Its purpose is to identify and assist urban and rural Scout troops whose camping and advancement programs are below standard.

### PROGRAM GOALS

- To act as a positive change agent in the midst of startling social, political, economic, and demographic events affecting urban and rural Scouts.
- To increase advancement and camping opportunities for Scouts in urban and rural troops whose programs might be insufficient.
- To fulfill the Order of the Arrow Strategic Plan.
- To create the opportunity for more urban and rural Scouts to become eligible for membership in the Order of the Arrow.
- To provide additional, positive youth and adult role models for disadvantaged urban and rural Scouts and adult leaders.
- To create a "guided discovery" for Order of the Arrow members to reflect on the ideal of "He alone is worthy to wear the arrow who will continue faithfully to serve his fellow man."

Although Kittatinny Lodge has not formally implemented this program, if you are interested in participating, or think your unit would benefit from a program such as this, please contact the Lodge Chief, the Lodge Adviser, or your District Executive. To participate as a mentor, you need the approval of the Lodge Chief, The Lodge Adviser, the Service Committee Chairman, and your District Executive.

## NEW FLAPS AVAILABLE AT SEPTEMBER WEEKEND

The new lodge flap will be available for the first time at the September OA weekend. The new flap commemorates the 80th year of Lodge 5 and the 30th year of Kittatinny.
