

NOAC Approaches - Will You Be There?

have even heard about NOAC. If you are a seasoned member of the Order, you already know that NOAC, the National Order of the Arrow Conference, is the premier event for excitement, friendship building, and learning about the organization. If you had to compare the event to something more familiar, NOAC is to the Order of the Arrow as the National Jamboree is to Scouting.

If you have not been to NOAC before, allow me to describe what should entice you to pursue NOAC as one of your Scouting goals. You may need some help convincing mom and dad to help pay your way to attend the event, so share this article with them as a selling tool.

NOAC could be your first chance to experience the full workings of and life on a major college campus. You get to live in dorms, eat cafeteria

If you have just joined the lodge, you may not food (and the food IS good at NOAC), and use all the facilities on campus: pools, gymnasiums, arenas, classrooms, etc. Much like attending a big school, you will have the opportunity to meet, mingle, and make friends with thousands of likeminded Arrowmen from all parts of the country. In 2002, there were 7,146 staff, participants, and guests representing 292 lodges in attendance.

> That's a lot of people, but "What kinds of things would I do at NOAC," you might ask. The answer is - a little bit of just about everything. If you like sports, air rifle, basketball, billiards, bowling, swimming, a 5k race, and TOAP (The Outdoor Adventure Place) featuring climbing and kayaking were available in 2002. FROM FLOW...


