Letter to Unit OA Representatives From Patrick Murphy 2005 National Chief

Dear Unit Representative,

The Boy Scouts of America recently completed a survey of boys who had left the Scouting program. I would appreciate it if you read this letter and share the information with your unit leadership.

The major conclusions from the survey are that young men drop out of the program due to the lack of a good unit program and not enough outdoor adventure. It is no secret that many boys join Scouting with a strong desire to go camping.

How vital is a having a good program? 38% of Scouts leave because of a poor unit program. Two of the major problems related to poor programming are time and personal relationships. When Scouts are not having fun, they are less willing to devote time to the program. Boys drop out so they can have more time to do other things that they enjoy more (32% of dropped Scouts listed this as a primary reason for leaving). Also, 23% left Scouting because of conflicts with unit leaders. Units with good program are less likely to have such conflicts. The Order of the Arrow believes that camping at least once a month is a vital component of a good unit program.

Another interesting statistic from the survey was that 69% of boys leave Scouting with the rank of Second Class or less. Advancement is a byproduct of a good camping program. Most Scouts in units that camp monthly should attain the rank of First Class within a year of joining the program.

How important is camping?

 51% of dropped Scouts come from troops with 5 or fewer camping outings per year.



News from the Committees

- 71% of dropped Scouts come from troops with 8 or fewer camping outings per year.
- Only 15% of dropped Scouts come from units that camp every month!

The Order of the Arrow places a strong emphasis on unit camping; in fact, two of the four purposes of the Order of the Arrow involve camping. The Order believes that Scouting reaches its greatest effectiveness in the outdoors. On a national level, the Order is committed to promoting camping and encouraging units to camp more frequently.

If your unit is not camping on a regular basis, you should ask to have some time set aside during the next Patrol Leaders Council meeting to have a discussion about the possibility of camping more often. If your unit is having trouble finding places to go camping, contact your lodge and ask for a copy of the *Where to Go Camping Guide*. This guide will give your unit great ideas on places to go camping and things to do in the outdoors. By camping more, Scouts will have a better Scouting experience!

Is the O.A. Really "Scouting's National Honor Society"?

The Order of the Arrow call itself "Scouting's National Honor Society." Many of you are in high school and some of you will soon be graduating. Hopefully, some of you are also in your school's chapter of the National Honor Society.

Your school's NHS chapter has 4 principles: Character, Scholarship, Leadership, and Service. These themes should sound pretty familiar to you as a Scout and as an O.A. member. You have probably heard at lodge meetings and in the Order's ceremonies that as an O.A. member, you should strive for a higher purpose in your Scouting and personal journey.

When you were elected to the Order of the Arrow, you were chosen by your fellow scouts because they saw in you certain characteristics which made you stand out from the others.

They saw someone who was a friend to his fellow scouts. Someone who they could trust, and some one who could trust in others. Someone who lived up to the principles of the Scout Oath and the Scout Law and demonstrated it in their daily life. Let's call this "character."

They saw a scout who had mastered his basic scout skills and could apply them in varied situations. You may have expertise in fire building, backpacking, or one of the many other Scout skills, and demonstrated an ability and desire to share that knowledge with others in your unit. That's the same as "scholarship."

They saw a leader, or someone with leadership potential waiting to be tapped. Someone who is willing to accept responsibility and to represent the needs of the group and look for new and exciting things to do. Someone who can plan and follow through with an idea. We'll call this "leadership."

And finally, they saw someone who was willing to give his time in unselfish service to others in his troop, in his church, or his community. Someone who knew that there is always someone out there who do not have it as good as he does, and is willing to try to make it better for that other person. We'll call that "service."

So it looks indeed like the O.A. is very much a National Honor Society of Scouting.

We hope and encourage each of you as members to live up to and constantly work on these characteristics. They are not simply something to put on your resume of life. They are characteristics which others will look for in you throughout your life if you make them important enough to guide you.

Much like high school NHS, you need to keep your skills current by testing yourself or by teaching, actively develop your leadership skills, keep giving service, and maintain your character. Only by doing this can you truly say to yourself that you are a part of this organization.

Don't accept membership as a passive thing. Take an active roll and put these characteristics to the test. Become involved. Not everyone will have the chance to lead as an officer or chairman, but if you look, there are things to do all around you. Find your niche, and 'Do Your Best' in this NHS of Scouting we call the O.A.

Conclave Staff Positions

Administration - The Administrative staff will be I charge of registration and check-in at Conclave. Staff will work closely with Health/Safety staff and others.

<u>Health/Safety</u>- The Health & Safety staff will be in charge of medical forms, medical rechecks and event security.

<u>Kitchen</u>- The Kitchen staff will be responsible for serving and preparing meals. They will also be responsible for maintenance in the dining hall after all meals. The Kitchen staff will also run heater stack for pre breakfast and water delivery.

<u>Logistics</u>- The Logistics staff will be responsible for campsite assignments, parking, locations of training cells and patch collection site. The Logistics staff will also choose program areas.

<u>Program</u>- The Program staff will be in charge of Friday night and Saturday afternoon activities. This staff will also be responsible for flag ceremonies and Chapel. The Program staff will also be responsible for running areas such as Shooting Sports, COPE, and Aquatics.

<u>Promotion/Conference Reps</u>- The Promotion/ Conference reps will be responsible for decorations and weekend presentations.

<u>Publications</u>- The Publications staff will be responsible for promoting Conclave via newsletters. The staff will also be responsible for putting together registration forms and a welcoming packet.

<u>Service</u>- The Service committee will be in charge of trash, transporting contingent gear, building campfires and showing support.

<u>Shows</u>- The Shows committee will be responsible for Opening Campfire, Saturday Night show and the awards ceremony.

<u>Staff Support</u>- The Staff Support will be responsible for goody bags and Cousins. Cousins are members of the staff that supervise the campsites and assist those that are in attendance.


<u>Trading Post</u>- The Trading Post staff will be responsible for running Kittatinny Inc. and running the camp Trading Post.
