Hello Brothers:

As the new year comes upon us I decided the Health and Safety Committee would make a New Year's Resolution of their own. Every Wolf's Tale issue Health and Safety will take the time to give our annual health/safety tip! That's right, now you can look forward to exciting new health tips every issue. You probably have assumed that Health and Safety is just the couple of guys sitting in the corner of the dining hall during service weekends, but we are trying to shed that stereotype by showing how useful we can be. Next weekend don't be afraid to stop by our corner for a little chat or more importantly if you are injured or ill. If you are interested in a health profession Health and Safety may be the perfect start for you, so give me a call or just talk to me at the next weekend.

Now for that ever-anticipated, very FIRST Health and Safety Tip. Since, it is a chilly winter, it is only natural to make our first tip about a cold-environment scenario. Have you ever been out in the snow a little too long and noticed your fingers start to turn bluish white and feel numb, like pins and needles? If you have you have experience mild frostbite, which if untreated can lead to permanent damage or even the loss of fingers, toes, and other apendages. The treatment is simple: get the affected area warm! The key is to get the victim out of the cold and slowly heating up the area- keyword being slowly. The nerve cells are vulnerable at this time so don't use hot water for a quick fix, instead use luke-warm water or stick the vic's hands in their "hot spots" which are under the armpits or in the groin. Also, do NOT try to rub your hands together to create friction to heat up your hands since this will only damage the vulnerable cells. If the area begins to turn black or remains numb after repeated warming, seek medical attention.

The Order of the Arrow has had a long-standing interest in coordinating a national service project, utilizing the infrastructure and leadership established over many years of success at the Boy Scouts of America's high adventure bases. Working closely together, the United States Forest Service and the OA have chosen five project sites, spread across America, that will be the focus of our combined efforts. ArrowCorps<sup>5</sup> (pronounced Arrow Corps Five) will provide a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for each participant to set an example of leadership in service to those who treasure our national forests.

Five thousand physically fit and able volunteers (determined by the "Philmont Weight Limits for Backpacking & Hiking"), made up of youth and adults, will participate. The national Order of the Arrow committee and key sponsors will fund the projects. Participants will pay a reasonable fee to help pay for accommodations, meals, and a full day of recreational activities during the projects.

Additional information will be available through the National Bulletin and National Order of the Arrow Web Site in the future. Mark Twain National Forest will be the first of the five sites to be featured starting in the fourth quarter of 2006 with the other four sites following in 2007.

# **High Adventure With the National OA**

Have you ever seen the Northern Lights or portaged a canoe? If not, then the Order of the Arrow has the opportunity for you to participate in the OA Voyage Program at Northern Tier Canoe Base in Ely, Minnesota.

Since 1999, the Order of the Arrow has provided Arrowmen between the ages of 16 and 21, the opportunity to explore and service the Boundary Waters and some of the most pristine wildlife seen by few. Even if you have portaged a canoe or participated in the program previously, there are other opportunities available to you.

All participants in the program are placed into crews that will service a portage trail for one week as it is imperative as members of the Boy Scouts of America to leave things better than we found them.

After learning how to use a variety of tools and how to effectively perform a "J-stroke," you and your crew will design your very own trek. These treks are unique in that many of them are longer and travel to un-chartered territory than the normal crews that leave the base.

Not very many people whom you go to school with or work with can say that they have paddled 185 miles by canoe to International Falls or portaged the final 4 miles that leads to Lake Superior.

These examples are experiences that will live with those crew members, who made some of the Voyage's memorable journeys. Experiences are what shape the people we will become in the future. Sign up today for a journey, you will surely not regret.
