## "Keep The Tradition Alive in Kittatinny V"

Greg Hafer Vigil Honor Memeber

An historic event happened for Kittatinny Lodge 5 at this years Vigil Weekend. Alex Hafer became the first third-generation Vigil member of his family and the lodge.

The Hafer family has had a long history in Scouting going back to the 1950's in the old Appalachian Trail Council in Schuylkill County. J. Carl Hafer, Sr. was an Assistant Scoutmaster and a Cubmaster in Tamaqua, his sons J. Carl Jr., J. Ted Hafer, and Greg Hafer all were involved in Scouting and all three sons became Eagle Scouts. Greg's sons Brandon and Alex are also very involved in Scouting in Pottsville. Brandon has completed his Eagle and Alex should complete his this spring. Carl Sr., Carl Jr., Ted and Greg began their Order of the Arrow involvement in Memeu Lodge 125 prior to the formation of Kittatinny Lodge. Carl Sr. received his Vigil Honor April 20, 1963 and was given the name "Papesu", "Patient One". Carl Jr. and Ted became Brotherhood members in Memeu lodge and were both active on their ceremonies

and dance teams. Greg began his OA experience during the transition of Memeu and Minsi Lodges. He took his Ordeal at Camp the following April at Camp Shikellamy in the newly formed lodge Kittatinny Lodge 5 created by the merger of Memeu Lodge 125 and Minsi Lodge 5. This was brought about when the two councils, Appalachian Trail and Daniel Boone, merged to form the present Hawk Mountain Council. In April of 2001 Greg did his Vigil outpost and was given the name "Achgegum Muskelanape Wishimnum", "teaches young men to fly". As Alex completed his Vigil outpost he was given the name "Landoawen Nachpi Atta Alemoagan" which means "Climbs with no fear" and those of you who attended Hawk Mountain Summer camp saw and worked with him this summer at the C.O.P.E course know where the name came from.

To use a line again that the lodge has used in the past, here is another example of how we... "Keep the tradition alive in Kittatinny V."



Brotherhood, cheerfulness, service. These are the principals our order is founded on. The "Brotherhood of cheerful service." In the next three editions I am going to focus my articles on these three words.

The first word is Brotherhood. Brotherhood is defined as, "Fellowship, all members of a profession or trade." So how does this apply to our organization? So by being a member of this Brotherhood you have the opportunity to meet people from all over the state, and nation.

So how can you do this? Well you must be an active member. Attend lodge functions, talk to people, join committees, call your chairmen or officers if you have a question (We'll be more than happy to talk to you.) Take your Brotherhood, or if already a Brotherhood member, help someone else earn theirs. Work on the new Participation Award. You can also serve your unit, because that is the main purpose of the OA, "to serve the unit." So on a closing note I would like to wish everyone (from bother to brother) a very Merry Christmas, and a Happy and safe New Year. ## **LODGE ANNOUNCES** PARTICIPATION AWARD

The lodge adopted a new program at the November Executive meeting. Beginning in 2003, the lodge will sponsor a Lodge Participation Award. The purpose of this award is to strengthen lodge membership through individual action in the unit and in the lodge.

The award year runs from January 1, 2003 until December 31, 2003, and is open to all registered lodge members. After that date, the award will begin again for the next year. Signatures can be obtained from any Lodge Executive Committee member, or your Scoutmaster where troop events are concerned.

- a. Attend 2 of the 3 OA Service weekends and quarterly meetings.
- **b.** Attend at least one: Lodge Executive Meeting, Brotherhood Day, Conclave.
- c. Attend (or staff) a resident camp or a National program such as Philmont, Northern Tier, Sea Base or NOAC.
- d. Attend at least 75% of your troop/team's regularly scheduled meetings.
- e. Attend 2 troop campouts other than the extended camp in requirement #3.
- f. Teach a scout a new skill.
- 2) Speak to the Lodge Chief, Advisor, or a Lodge Executive Committee member about what you have done and what you plan to do for the OA and your unit in the future.

Remember - Those who chose you, need you. Don't forget your pledge of service to your unit and to Scouting as a member in our Order.

## Kittatinny Belt Buckles Return

Kittatinny, Inc. has been approved to reissue a set of Kittatinny Lodge belt buckles. These have not been made in many years. A minimum run number must be met, so it is important to place your order. If you have not seen these before, each buckle is of the same mold design with inset green wolf eyes, and a redesigned clasp to fit standard BSA leather belts. The buckles will come in three styles and materials:
