Membership Plans for Records Update


The lodge year is winding down but it's not over yet! There are still some great activities planned through the end of the year, and a lot of work to do in the Membership Committee. Membership is definitely a committee that operates year-round!

As announced at NOAC in August, for the first time in O.A. history, every lodge in the country is now using O.A. Lodge Master as its official record keeping and reporting tool, and our lodge has been using the system in one way or the other since around 2008. We are continuing to find and implement new uses of the system to enhance lodge events and other operations.

Over time, some of our records have become out-of-date.

To prepare for a cleanup of our records, Membership in the early stages of developing a multi-month project to consolidate and update the lodge current and historical membership records. Our goal will be to consolidate all the membership records we have, including historical records, into O.A. Lodge Master so they are all at one place, accessible by everyone that needs access to them.

To kick off this project, we are planning on doing dues renewal a bit different this Fall. Ra-



ther than just sending you a renewal notice card, we are planning to send out a letter and include a copy of your O.A. Individual History report. This includes your contact information; event history; awards ; positions held in the lodge; ceremonial parts; and service hours recorded. What we will be asking you to do is review this data and correct any errors and add any additional data we don't have, to complete your O.A. record as completely as possible. Your participation in returning the updates will make or break this project, so please actively participate.

With all this going on, we are also looking for some additional Arrowmen to help on the committee. If you have an interest in keeping records, data entry, and/or preserving lodge records, then this is the committee for you. Fellow Arrowmen:

Each of us has the ability to make an important difference. Whether you know it or not, each of us has the power to make a difference in the lodge. As inspiration for all of us to realize that each of us can do things to help improve our lodge, here are several people in history that have proven one person can make important differences.

Gandhi made peaceful protest and peaceful civil disobedience a valuable process of peaceful change. Susan B. Anthony rose to the challenge as a famous leader of the battle to obtain women's right to vote in the U.S. In 1908, an acclaimed English war hero, Robert Baden Powell, founded the Scouting movement in Great Britain. Seven years later at Treasure Island in the Delaware River, E. Urner Goodman launched an innovative program, the Order of the Arrow, which is based on peer recognition and

service to others. John F. Kennedy, America's thirty-fifth President believed that "one person can make a difference and every person should try."

We need to realize that important improvements can begin with one person. If that one person is truly passionate about his or her mission, then he or she can make a difference. You may not realize that each and every one of you is important and can make a difference. But just think that if one person can make a difference, imagine the difference a group of committed Arrowmen can make to the lodge.

This past August I was fortunate to see what happens when 2,000 Arrowmen volunteered to serve on staff at the National Order of the Arrow Conference (NOAC). They succeeded in creating an event which provided a lifetime of memories for 14,000 Arrowmen and fellow Brothers. I was truly inspired throughout the en-

tire week. I am also inspired by our own lodge. I see great potential in the youth Arrowmen I encounter at each lodge event. They are making the first step in their journey. I would like to encourage all of you to continue to take steps forward and continue that journey.

We need young Arrowmen to continue to make improvements in the Communications and other committees. I challenge each of you to do more in the Lodge. If you are not on a committee, find a committee that suits your talents and interests. If you are already on a committee, find other Arrowmen to join your committee. Show them the way. Be the example and guide them to do more. What would happen if every Arrowman was more deeply involved in the lodge?
